



NCAA schools require college-bound student-athletes to build a foundation of high school courses to prepare them for the academic expectations in college.



What are core courses?

Not all high school classes count as NCAA core courses. Only classes in English, math (Algebra 1 or higher), natural or physical science, social science, foreign language, comparative religion or philosophy may be approved as NCAA core courses. Remedial classes and classes completed through credit-by-exam are not considered NCAA core courses.



CHOOSING ELECTIVES

- ✓ Choosing electives is now done on Genesis through the parent portal
- ✓ Together you and your student must make 5 elective requests and assign them a number according to your student's preference (important!!)
- ✓ Choose electives related to your student's interests and potential college/career field
- ✓ Refer to the course booklet for elective prerequisites
- ✓ Make sure you and your student have a plan to meet the elective graduation requirements by senior year
- ✓ Student option and Co-op require applications (grade 12)

If your student was not recommended for Honors or AP and would like to advance, they must:

- ✓ Complete a Course Waiver form (see their counselor)
- ✓ Complete Google Doc for each waiver
